Presently the school is New Zealand curriculum (*Mainstream*).

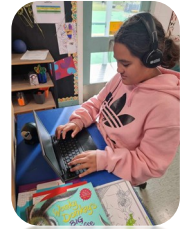
Dual-education in Aotearoa, New Zealand, refers to the system where students can be taught in either English or Māori, the indigenous language of New Zealand. This approach allows for education in two languages and cultures, catering to different communities and promoting bilingualism and biculturalism.

Te Marautanga o Aotearoa is the national curriculum for Māori-medium education. It provides guidelines and standards for teaching and learning in schools where instruction is primarily in Māori. This curriculum aims to support the preservation and growth of the Māori language and culture, ensuring that students not only gain knowledge in various subjects but also develop a strong understanding of their cultural heritage.
